I hereby present a Complaint agreeably to the good order established among friends against N. Brown a Member of Pickering Preparative Meeting for having virtually subjected me to the total loss of seventy five Pounds of lawful money of U. Canada with interest for the same [illegible] the 8 ms. 1819 to the present time besides heavy Expense by a most palpable breach of trust if from no [illegible], but of which the Society will be better able to judge upon knowing the circumstances of the case more at [large] than will be prudent to the trouble the Meeting in full detail with unless at its request which I then should be fully authorized to do. It was caused by the said N. Brown withholding a certain Note of hand for nearly three years from my Agent Peter Lossing of Norwich which Note I had put into his hands to convey to the said P Lossing when at New York in 6 mo. 182[cut off] and who denied receiving it at my hands until 3 mo. 1823 and until I had possitively declared that it was my intention if health permitted to cross the Atlantic again and bring those to his face who saw me give it in his charge, and agreeably thereto, and at the earnest request of my Agent .P Lossing I again Crossed the Ocean and landed at N. York the

beginning of last 12 mo 182[cut off] and informing myself thereof the time and place of holding the Half Year's Meeting in U. Canada Expecting [cut off] see the parties concerned at Westlake I met them there accordingly, and not being able to come to any satisfactory terns with N. Brown he wished us to lay our case before [cut off] friends for counsel – And the day he left Westlake he [cut off] a number of friends together, the greater part of whom I am now convinced were special favorites of the said NB and by him selected. Before them I opened out the case by reading over the last letter I received from my Agent P. Lossing and requested their [cut off] in the case. J.C. stood up and said their sentiments were [cut off] no use except we were disposed to act upon them. Knowing I can not go to law with him consistently I replyed I had no objections to [cut off]

the case to them to arbitrate that I wanted nothing but impart[cut off] justice between man and man that justice I should look for at [cut off] hands tho' a perfect stranger in a strange land (not knowing one face [cut off] them) N. Brown readily agreed to the terms and the case was [submitted] to them accordingly. Upon leaving it with them my last words [to] them were, friends do not hurry this business but where evidence [cut off] wanting wait for it even if I have to send to N York for it. Instead [cut off] which without even calling for the letter I had read to them or [cut off] any other evidence than (as I said before) my reading over to them [cut off] P. Lossing's last letter to me at the opening [out] the case to them [cut off] J. Cronk giving his evidence. That at the time Brown agreed to [cut off] my note he did not hear him express any reluctance or guard [him] in the peculiar manner he had asserted at my first interview [cut off] Brown at Westlake. But, to my utter astonishment in a few hours without requiring from Brown one single explanation [cut off] even sending for us again to them gave their Award for me [to] [cut off] [receive] my note of Brown without any other consideration what [cut off] for all the trouble and expences he had put me to by his [un]warantable witholding my said Note

Now I [pressure] by a [cut off] construction of their award as it now stands that it was [cut off] binding upon me only on the principle that Brown deliver me [cut off] Note in full force and value as it was when he received it of me [cut off] against the drawers and Indorsers for its true amount. Whereas [cut off] the time of this award been given the Indorsers stood [compleately] exonorated by said breach of trust and I am prepared to prove [cut off] by the said breach of trust the drawers from a state of solvency [cut off] the said note became due, but could not be presented for payment [cut off] have become insolvent or nearly so and consequently it can not be collected without a course of law under very doubtful [prospect] of obtaining any thing with the risque of heavy Costs against the prosecutor. To the Half Years Meeting of Friends in Upper Canada

#### **Dear Friends**

As we have reason to beleive, that by means of the deplorable contest between this Country and the United States of America, you are deprived of a due intercourse with your own Yearly Meeting; and that from the same cause your trials may be augmented; we are induced to offer you the salutation of our Love and the assurance of our sympathy.

We desire, at the same time, to remind you, that, however separated you may be from outward help, the sincear harted followers of Christ are still under the notice of him who is omnipresent and omnipotent, No outward circumstances can prevent their application in spirit to the Lord, nor the extention of the Holy Arm of help, wether secretly revealed, or more openly manifested: let

us therefore beseech you to seek for increasing ability to trust in him, and to evince by your circumspect conduct that you are the Children of one famaly, that you are truly redeemed from the spirit of violence and contests. On the latter subject we affectionately offer you the following appropriated advice given by George Fox, part of which was quoted in the Epistle to us from your last Yearly Meeting.

Whatever bustlings and troubles, tumults or outrages, quarrels or strifes, arise in the world, keep out of them all, concern not yourselves with them; but keep in the Lords power and peaceable Truth that is over all such things, in which power ye seek the peace and good of all men, live in the love which God hath shed abroad in your harts, through Jesus Christ, in which love nothing is able to seperate you from God and Christ; neither outward sufferings, persecutions, nor any thing that is below and without; nor to hinder or break your heavenly fellowship in the Light, Gospel and Spirit of Christ; nor your holy communion in the Holy Ghost, that proceeds from the father and the Son, which leads into all Truth.

# EPISTLE FROM THE YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS

HELD IN NEW YORK,

By adjournments, from the 23d of 5<sup>th</sup> mo. to the 27<sup>th</sup> of the same, inclusive, 1831, To its subordinate Meetings and Members composing the same.

#### **DEAR FRIENDS:**

Under a renewed sense of the loving kindness of our Heavenly Father, we have again been favoured to assemble in the capacity of a Yearly Meeting. In attending to the interesting concerns of our religious society, we have experienced in the several sittings of this meeting, a degree of harmony and brotherly condescension encouraging to our minds, in which a concern for the support of the discipline, and the maintainance of our various testimonies have been manifested to mutual edification; calling for thankfulness to the author of all our sure mercies.

This meeting has been large, and our minds have been drawn towards those members of society who have not had the opportunity of being present. We salute you, dear friends, in the love of the gospel, with desires for your welfare and establishment in the truth – under a degree of this precious influence, it was concluded to address you by an epistle; setting forth some of the exercises of this meeting, on the weight concerns which have come before us.

In attending to the reports from the Quarterly Meetings, the exceptions in the answers to the queries, have brought concern over the minds of many friends, who have been enabled to offer counsel and exhortation that should have due place with all. In most of the answers some deficiencies are obvious in the attendance of our religious meetings, more particularly in those held in the middle of the week. Let us, dear friends, seriously consider the many weaknesses that attend the omission of this great and important duty: may we not fear that it arises in too many instances from an inordinate love of the world; in which our love to the Creator and preserver of men, is cold and unfruitful. Were we duly to consider how much we owe to the goodness of God, whose mercies are reserved oftener than the morning; we should delight in the stated occasions for religious worship; but if we suffer our minds to be captivated by the pleasures and pursuits of the world, we become careless and indifferent to spiritual blessings. The undue estimate of lawful things, is adverse to our progress in a religious life. "We cannot serve God and mammon."

There is no class exempt from the snares of the world. The aged, middle aged, and the young, are alike beset with temptations incident to their different states. All have need to watch and pray, and that continually; for those who have made the greatest advancement in the spiritual life have need of a daily renewal of strength. Under a proper view of the uncertainty of the things of time, we feel the necessity there is of "laying up treasure in heaven," – in this disposition of mind, few would be found absent from our religious meetings. Beloved friends, let us not deceive ourselves. "God is not mocked for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh, shall of the flesh reap corruption, but he that soweth to the spirit, shall of the spirit reap life everlasting." Gal. vi. 7, 8.

The guarded education of our children of a subject of primary importance to the welfare and stability of our religious society. We cannot, it is true, confer grace upon them, "it is the gift of God," but there is much for parents to do; a tender and watchful care, may prevent the growth of noxious weeds, that when suffered to prevail choke the good seed. The indulgence of habits and inclinations opposed to the simplicity of our profession, is oftentimes checked by the timely care of parents and guardians, to the lasting good of the objects of their charge. But we ought especially to keep in view the influence of parental example, - we cannot expect the divine blessing to attend the efforts we may make for the good of our offspring, unless our own wills are subjected to the cross of Christ; we must experience its restraining influence in ourselves before we can effectually recommend it to our children.

If the past has been marked by peculiar trials in our religious society, we may profit by the lessons of experience; future advancement can only be rendered more prosperous, through and by individual faithfulness. "If ye love me, (said our blessed Lord,) keep my commandments." By obedience to him we shall experience the truth of his declaration. "I am the way, the truth, and the life, no man cometh to the Father but by me." "If any man serve me," saith Christ, "let him follow me: and where I am, there shall also my servant be." The beloved Son came in the prepared body, not to do his own will, but the will of the Father who sent him, and we shall experience, as we "mind the light," that the subjugation of our will to the manifestation of the divine will, is a necessary attainment for all who acknowledge Christ to be the "way;" and this way is plain as seen by the Lord's prophet. "And a high way shall be there, and a way, and it shall be called, the way of holiness, the unclean shall not pass over it; but it shall be for those: the wayfaring men, though fools shall not err therein."

In meekness and humility is the safety of all who profess to be the followers of Christ. "The meek will he guide in judgment" and "the meek will be to teach his way," he will "beautify the meek with salvation." In this safe abiding place we shall not permit our minds to derive any gratification from the weaknesses of others; instead of looking outward with an evil eye upon any, we shall direct this vigilance to the scrutiny of our own actions; rejoicing in whatever promotes the cause of righteousness, and the kingdom of Christ, which is "peace on earth, good will to men"

Finally dear friends, brethren and sisters of every class, the times call for redoubled diligence on the part of all. The precious testimonies of the society were faithfully maintained by our worthy predecessors, whom persecution could not subdue, – they devolved upon us in a day of much outward ease and prosperity. The faithful at times feel a godly jealousy, lest reposing in the labours of others, we should let go the important trust committed to us, and lightly esteem the privileges transmitted to us by our faithful predecessors, who through good and evil report walked worthily before men, counting it great joy to suffer with Christ. Knowing, as said the apostle, "If we suffer, we shall also reign with him; if we deny him, he also will deny us." Tim. ii. 2, 12.

Satisfactory epistles were received from the Yearly Meetings of Philadelphia, Baltimore, Ohio and Indiana, where Friends after a season of trial similar to our own, are encouraged to persevere in support of our christian testimonies.

#### Dear Friend:

Just before Rufus M. Jones left for his visit to the Orient, he wrote the enclosed article for us to give to people coming to Philadelphia this summer and inquiring about the Quakers. It is distributed at the Friends' Meeting House on "High Street" at the Sesqui-Centennial. We are also glad to send it to any one caring to have it.

To my mind, Prof. Jones' visit to China and India opens great possibilities. He was chosen by the young Chinese Christians as the one foreigner who could speak to their annual conference this summer. His addresses are being printed in Chinese and English and he has repeated them at a number of Chinese Universities – usually with one hour for address and two hours for questions and discussion. He goes to India this month where he plans to meet Gandhi. Through these two men I expect the East and the West to understand each other better.

The American Friends Service Committee is joining with some interested Chinese in building a friendship Village in Shanghai – 24 cottages for dispossessed working men's families – moderate rent and sanitary – financed half in China and half in America.

Through cooperation with the Japan Friends Service Committee in selecting the students, we have this year three Japanese students in America on the scholarships contributed by the American people; one an educator taking courses at Swarthmore and the University of Pennsylvania; one a young woman at Smith College, Mass., and one a young man at Hope College, Michigan.

We are always glad to help keep our interested friends in touch with the life and thought of Friends and the efforts to apply the Quaker ideals in the life of the world.
